Through launching international fashion brands with Andira, Beth experienced the growing need for environmentally conscious design and was inspired to create her own line: Rain Tees.

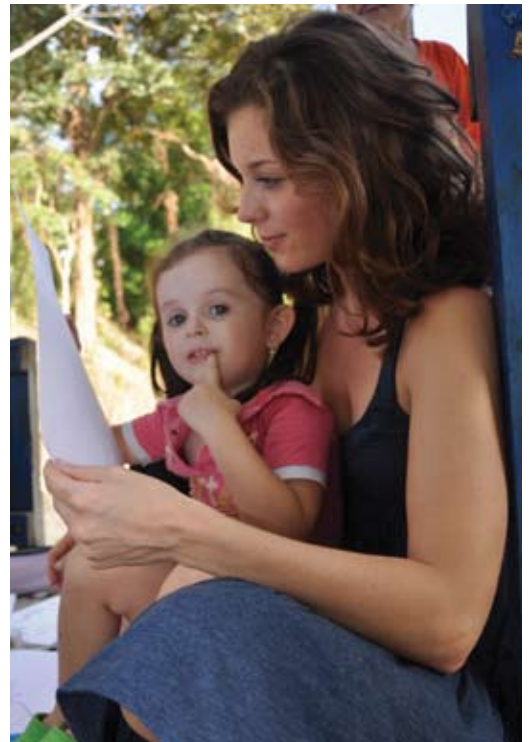
